Violence against Women and Children in India

- Sex ratio of women:men 933:1000
- ★Sex ratio of girls:boys 927:1000
- *A woman is raped every half an hour
- *Every day, 5 women die over dowry disputes; 200 girls enter sex work
- *20,000 female foetuses aborted every year
- *11.28 100 mn estimated child labourers



Overview of the Police in Karnataka

- *The Indian police: a colonial legacy (1861 Act)!
- **★**Individual States have own acts/rules
- *Karnataka approx. 192,000 sq km with a population of 55 million (slightly smaller than the UK)
- *The police force approx. 75,000 (2.6% are women)
- *1 police officer per 733 people in Karnataka



History of the GSPP Project (1)

★2001 − 2003

- ★ Creation of a Training Module for PS level personnel – over 500 police officers consulted (constables to DG-IG) through pilot workshops and interviews
- *Coordination through a children's organisation with the support of Bangalore City Police and UNICEF



History of the GSPP Project (2)

***** 2003-2006

- ★ Joint partnership b/w Karnataka State Police and UNICEF – ADGP the nodal officer
- ★Project Team set up to coordinate+implement workshops and community outreach programmes
- *Review and monitoring (follow up visits, reviews by senior officers, Video Conferencing with SPs across the state...)



Elements of the Module

- * Participatory methodologies with a small group (40-50 participants from constables to sub-inspectors)
- Gender and power relations, and the institutional analysis of violence
- Violence against women laws and procedures
- Violence against children laws and procedures
- Counselling skills used by the police
- Trafficking of women and children issues, laws and procedures
- HIV/AIDS and police responsibilities
- Public perceptions and police behaviour



The Strategies/Impact So Far (1)

- **★** Violence ag. women and children NOT a 'women's issue', not marginal shifts in police consciousness (men and women)
- Protection of women and children as an entry point for a rights-based approach
- * Over 2,250 police officers trained across 438 police stations (3% of staff, 53% of stations) inservice and probationary
- * 130 'police trainers' as peer educators
- Increased confidence in women officers
- * Profiling of issue at all levels of police, esp. senior



The Strategies/Impact So Far (2)

- * Coordination between local PS, CSOs and community groups: cases and community outreach programmes (Child Rights Week, Dom. Violence)
- * 'People-friendly Police Stations' as models of state-public partnerships across Bangalore
- Capacity building of CSOs on legal advocacy and police procedures for cases of women and children
- * Karnataka 1st in country to institutionalise training in GS, HIV/AIDS at PS level
- * Karnataka module now being adapted for all-India usage by Govt. of India



Why Change XXtra Special?

- Workshop focus on attitudinal change
- 'Walking the Talk' both personal and professional
- Peer learning

- More responsive access for complainants
- Women officers special training
- Resource commitment from the system

- Shifts in PS culture
- Some changes of behaviour at home (officers report abuse ag. married children)

- GS in curriculum at police training schools/academies
- 10% min. recruitment of women
- Formal reviews of cases
- GOs, circulars on issue



Challenges

- *Size, numbers and socio-political complexities of individuals and the system
- *'Routinisation' of issue as with all others
- *Middle-level officers: powerful, confident and unwilling to change (next phase of training)
- *Training not as a one-off input but repeated intervention (peer trainers effective in this)
- *Easier to work on children's rights than women's rights (therefore part of strategy)
